Thursday 7th September, Cricket

U17 National Cup Final v Shrewsbury School at Loughborough University

After travelling up to Loughborough University the day before the final, we arrived nice and early at Brockington Oval and settled into our preparations. It was a perfect day for the final and the wicket looked good. Henry Nicholls lost only his second toss in our run to the final and Shrewsbury, last year's champions, decided to bat first. Morgan and Claisse began fairly well but were unlucky to see a few edges race beyond slip for boundaries. Shrewsbury cashed in on their early fluency and raced to 45/0 from the 7 over powerplay. Claisse then clean bowled their England U19 opener and added their captain in his final over, via a well taken catch by Baker. At 75/2 from 14, Whitfield and Hockey came into the attack and tried to hold back any acceleration from Shrewsbury. Hockey had the remaining opener caught by Baker and we felt more positive about things at 100-3 from 19 overs.

However, Shrewsbury were regularly able to find the boundary through the next 10 overs which allowed their score to keep going at around 7 an over. Baker had kept the scoring tight from his end and then took two wickets in succession in his final over. The Shrewsbury keeper, who had been content to play second fiddle, then moved up through the gears and accelerated to his half-century. Some strong strokes late on helped Shrewsbury post 229/8 in their 35 overs and the mid-game momentum had swung in their favour.

With 9 of Shrewsbury's team having played in last year's U17 final success, they proved a confident team with the ball and in the field. The openers immediately put us under pressure and made scoring difficult. Whitfield was given out early on before Morgan soon departed too. The contrast of each side's first powerplay was stark as we limped to 11/2 from our opening 7 overs. Nicholls and Baker continued to graft but Nicholls was caught at the first sign of any fluency from us in the middle. Once Hockey had followed Baker back to the pavilion at 68/5 in the 22nd over, a miserable outcome seemed inevitable.

At this point, James Kennedy took it upon himself to try and change our fortunes. He played without fear and displayed an array of shots to all parts of the field, particularly utilising reverse sweeps and paddles to exploit the short straight boundaries. Kulkarni and Bristowe stuck with Kennedy to form some partnerships that helped us towards some respectability in our chase. Kennedy continued to attack until he was caught for 63 from 50 balls. We finished 165/9. Shrewsbury were deserved winners on the day. We will benefit from the experience of the occasion and sure many of the side will be eager to get back to a final again soon. (JMB)
