Tuesday 12th October Golf: ISGA Regional Semi-Final v Lord Wandsworth College

The golf team had a very important game at Hockley this week: an ISGA knockout match to secure a place in the regional final and propel them further towards this year's nationals. The 3 man team, composed of Adrien Joly (captain), Taanvir Sood (X) and Arthur Hampel (B) wore each of their opponents down with golfing excellence, a perfectly timed response to last week's unfortunate loss, respectively beating their opponents 8&7, 1up, and 5&4. Kingsbury offered short, and instinctively rolled the ball into the space that he had created, timing perfectly with the arching run of Jin from the right side. Jin advanced the ball, steadied himself and then struck it cleanly past the approaching keeper from the top of the box. When Claisse then set the trap off a Wellington goal kick he quickly pressed, won the ball and lifted it calmly over the keeper to give us the lead. Wellington maintained a direct approach which was regularly repelled now that Street and James-Duff began to command the aerial duel. They still created chances, however, and hit both cross bar and post.

Kingsbury then settled our nerves as we again won the ball from a high-press and he calmly rolled it in at the near post. He added his second soon afterwards and we had control of the game. Switching wings for the first time this season allowed Chiang some freedom down the right-hand side and he added our 5th with a lofted shot from a tight angle.
