This is a belated Week 8 report covering the sporting action from before the exeat weekend.

Tuesday 15th June: Cricket

Yearlings Av Churcher's College; Hampshire County Schools Cup Semi Final

Playing on Lord's (thanks to Kim and his groundstaff) on a rare balmy evening, Churcher's batted first and some tight bowling from the new ball pair of Seb Morgan and Jack Bristowe restricted the score to 14 off the first 4 overs before spin was introduced into the attack in the form of Sam Humphreys and George Bowder. Both bowled with good control and were supported by some excellent fielding (6 catches in total including 3 for Morgan and 2 for Ted Miers) and smart field placing. Humphreys took a wicket with his second ball and finished with 4-15 from his 4 over spell. Morgan returned to the attack and his pace was too much for both the unfortunate batters and one of the recently purchased T20 stumps which now needs replacing (much to the annoyance of both the MIC Cricket and the Chief Accountant). There were wickets too for Amaar Malik and Vikrant Kheterpal.

Yearlings' openers Malik and Will Alexander set about chasing down the victory target of 93 with an opening stand of 40 before Alexander fell to an outstanding catch in the 7th over. Malik played well before playing across a straight one to be bowled for a run-a-ball 28 with the score on 70 whilst Morgan batted in typically positive fashion with some powerful and attractive stroke play and victory was achieved with 8 overs to spare.

The sometimes-grumpy coach seemed well pleased with the team's all-round performance on this occasion and is no doubt keen that the standards which have been set are maintained for the remainder of this season's campaign and beyond. (MCE)
