

#### Sports Report: Cloister Time, Week 9

### Monday 21st & Tuesday 22nd June: Golf: Micklem Trophy, Sunningdale GC

Having benefitted from the support of the OW Golf Society in providing the boys with the opportunity to play a practice round at Sunningdale last Thursday, confidence was high amongst the golf team that they could make this advantage pay against Rugby in round 1 of the Micklem Trophy.

The team of 5 were matched up in singles format and all players were keen to get off to a good start. After five holes honours were even with Rugby up in 2, Winchester up in 2 and one game level but by the 9<sup>th</sup> hole Jordan Thompson had edged ahead to give us a slender lead. As the boys came off the 13th two of the games had been determined already. Number 3 player Adrian Joly was on top form and won his game 6&5 but skipper Kushe Saggi struggled on the greens and went down to a similar score. By this time the top game was level, James Brockman was up by two and Tanvir Sood was down by two. Coming off the 17th green the match was tied 2-2 with Brockman joining Joly in victory and Tanvir going down 3&2. Having overturned a 1-hole deficit Jordan was now "dormy 1" on the last. A hooked tee shot seemed to open the door for his opponent but the Rugby first player topped one off the tee into the rough and didn't manage to advance his second shot very far up the fairway. Thankfully, Jordan's ball, although well offline, was playable but he struck too strong a 4 iron which went beyond the green and resulted in an under hit chip shot. Eventually both players were on the green for 4 but the Rugby player had the shorter putt. Jordan lagged up well and sank his put meaning his opponent had the chance to make his putt to win the hole and force a sudden death play off. The putt edged past the cup resulting in a halved hole and Jordan took the win to make the match 3-2.

The following morning Winchester now faced Stowe in the semi-final. The Buckinghamshire school have recently spent  $\pounds 2m$  renovating their on-site golf course and have a resident PGA pro at school every afternoon so certainly take their golf seriously. Nevertheless, confidence amongst the team was high and fine weather meant there was much to look forward to over the ensuing four hours or so.

At the halfway point Stowe had the lead in three matches and Winchester were up in two but with plenty of holes remaining there was certainly no need to panic. However, the next few holes saw Stowe creep back into Game 2 and take the lead despite Brockman's best efforts. Kushe and Adrien found their opponents on top form and went down on the 13<sup>th</sup> & 14<sup>th</sup> in games 3 and 5. Tanvir maintained his lead and Jordan was dominant in his game taking the match after the 15<sup>th</sup>. Brockman was striving to get back to "dormy" and at least force the match into an extra hole but he was unable to take the 17<sup>th</sup> hole and so now the game was at an irreversible 3 down. In order to allow Stowe time to grab something to eat before the final Tanvir's game was determined a halve, even though he was 1 up with 1 to play so the match score went down 3.5 to 1.5.

Taking into consideration the limited matches played this year the golf team did well to push Stowe in the semi-finals. Nevertheless, with three of team here next year the boys should be setting their aspirations on pushing for the trophy and be prepared to invest the necessary time to hone all aspects of their play.
